LEARNING FROM WHERE WE HAVE BEEN: REFLECTIVE

Reflective learners think deeply about their experiences. They consider what they've learned, how they've grown, and how they might move forward. This kind of reflection has been at the heart of our daily life at Little Em's through project work, shared conversations, documentation, and relationships. Reflection empowers children to understand themselves as learners and members within a community.

The Reggio Emilia Approach teaches us that learning is a process, not a product. Through our Hands to Horizons exhibition, we do not showcase an end result. We celebrate the journeys, the hands that shaped clay, painted stories, constructed meaning, and reached out to understand the world. To reflect is to honor each step, even the uncertain or messy ones.



GROWING WITH INTEGRITY: PRINCIPLED



A principled learner acts with honesty, fairness, and respect. At Little Em's, these values are not taught through rules but cultivated through authentic relationships. Children make choices, resolve conflicts, care for shared spaces, and learn that their actions

impact others.

As the school year closes, we recognize how our students, young as they are, have practiced being principled in their own ways. They've shown kindness in group projects, courage in speaking up, and responsibility in taking care of their environment and materials. These are not small achievements. They are the roots of ethical, global-minded citizens.

FROM HANDS TO HORIZONS: CARRYING VALUES FORWARD



This year's exhibition, Hands to Horizons, beautifully captures the essence of both these attributes. The children's hands have been their

tools for building, expressing, testing, and caring. And now, those hands begin to stretch toward new horizons.

You can nurture these attributes by:

Encouraging reflection

Ask your child what they're proud of this year, what was hard, and what they want to try next.

Talking about values

When making decisions as a family, talk openly about fairness, honesty, and respect.


Celebrating growth


"The OK Book" - Amy Krouse Rosenthal


A thoughtful tale about mindfulness, kindness, and doing what is right.
